

A Message from the School Board

Kia Ora & Talofa Lava,

Let me introduce myself and share with you my cultural taonga / measina about my whakapapa / genealogy of my si'omaga / places of belonging.

Let me start with birth and legal name. My first name is Leatuao, my middle name is Larry, and my surname is Tupa'i-Lavea. Tupa'i-Lavea my fathers and mothers' genealogy roots through family titles, of which their father's held – Tupa'i Logovii from the village of Niusuatia, Upolu and Lavea Feterika from the village of Safotu, Savaii.

I am very blessed and very fortunate to hold church and community roles. As an ordained clergy I am an Archdeacon of the Anglican Church of Aotearoa, New Zealand, and Polynesia. I am referred to as The Venerable Reverend Father Leatuao Larry Tupa'i-Lavea.

As a Samoan Aotearoa New Zealander, I hold several paramount chief titles that connect me to my genealogical roots, my whakapapa, my si'omaga and places of belonging and identity! I am Toleafoa from the village of Faiaai, Savaii & the village of Faasitoo, Upolu). I am Tuilimu from the Village of Niusuatia, Upolu). I am Tuala from the village of Leauvaa, Upolu. I am Lotumali'i from the Village of Paia, Savaii.

As a community leader I am the Ambassador for the Children's Rights of Samoa / Le To'omaga Mo e Puapuagatia, chair the Pola Puipui Inc Society NZ, Secretary for the Mafutaga So'ofa'atasi O Faifeau I Aukilani / Incorporated Society of Church Ministers in Auckland, Secretary for Samoan Caucus of the Pacific Leadership Forum amongst other roles, and also a business owner with my wife Helen of a company employing around 100 staff in central South Auckland.

It is my privilege to have been nominated as the Presiding Member (formal for Chairperson) for the MRGS School Board and whakawhetai / fa'afetai lava to the Board for their confidence in my leadership. I have served on the School Board since 2022 under the outstanding leadership of Marjet Pot. I extend my sincere thanks, including on behalf of all those who have served alongside Marjet, for her mahi / tautua / service of over 20 years to the School and Board, including 19 of those years as our Presiding Member.

My children Lincoln & Paige are current students, and my oldest children Phoenix & Jahvan are alumni of MRGS. In their time and to this day, I have been grateful to all the teachers and support staff for dedication and commitment to give of their best to the learning and growth of our students, importantly, their leadership and setting the example of the Roskill Way in bringing to life the Roskill Values of Manaakitanga, Whanaungatanga and Tūmanakotanga!

I look forward to working with the Principal, Kaiako and our wider school whānau / aiga and community. One of my core values is that the partnership between our kura and our whānau and community is paramount so that it looks and feels genuine in the way we show up and take ownership as kaitiaki of MRGS! I look forward to meeting many of you in the coming months to further strengthen these valuable connections. We will continue the hard work of our School Board to support your children to be educated as successful powerful learners, and active responsible citizens.

I leave you with one of my favourite quotes from an Anglican Clergyman who founded the Methodist Church of England, Rev John Wesly: "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can."

Phones & Earphones

"Away for the Day", is a government implementation for all schools in New Zealand. Once students are at school, they will be required to have their phone and headphones in their bags, on silent, at all times.

If your child were to be seen with their phone, they will firstly be reminded of the expectations of phones and asked to put it away. The next step would be a conversation with their Dean. For subsequent times, you may be required to meet with the Senior Leader of your child's House, and your child will lose the privilege of having their phone with them at school for a certain number of days.

"Away for the Day" enables students to strengthen their interpersonal skills and relationships, actively participate in lunch time activities, and remove themselves from the negative aspects of phone use while at school.

Mount Roskill Grammar School Devices for Learning

We are a Bring Your Own Device (BYOD)



Your child needs a device for learning to bring to school. All of our courses have an online component and devices are used by students on a daily basis to access learning activities and resources. We are not able to

provide learning devices for all of our students. In some instances teachers will be able to provide a small number of computers to classes when needed, but this provision cannot be relied upon to cover all device needs. Any online assessment that takes place can be supported through the School's resources.

Purchasing a Device

There are many retail options available for purchasing a device. If you go to <u>Datatek Pacific NZ</u> and let them know you are part of the MRGS community you can secure preferential pricing. <u>NZ Laptop</u> <u>Wholesale</u> provides affordable options on new and refurbished learning devices. Big retailers like Harvey Norman, Noel Leeming and Warehouse Stationery will also offer good deals on Chromebooks and Laptops.

If you have a client relationship with Work and Income NZ, you may qualify for support from them. Email <u>chris.dunn@mrgs.school.nz</u> and we will send you a letter to support your application for a learning device to be supplied at very low to no cost.
